How does my genetic result affect my ability to process citalopram (Celexa®)?

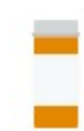
Citalopram is a medication primarily used to treat depression.

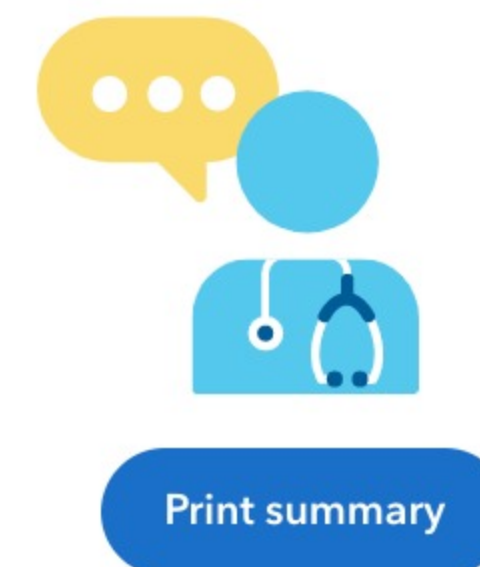
Serotonin is a chemical messenger that carries signals between brain cells. SSRI antidepressants help treat depression by increasing levels of serotonin in the brain.
